After almost 15 years, the committee is proud to announce that we finally received our occupancy permit for HAC House in Hamilton Road.

It has been a long time coming and we have experienced many delays and deferrals over time. We have always been legal and insured to use the building, but we have never had that piece of paper to make it official.

Last year, the HRCC informed us that we had to carry out certain works on the building to conform with current laws and specifications or they would not allow us to use the building.

The committee appointed Jack Janetzki to manage the project. He has done an amazing job. We now have a foyer, tiered seating in the rehearsal space, and renovated toilets and bathrooms. We have also removed two skip bins full of rubbish from the building which has provided additional storage space and a cleaner working environment.

The committee would like to sincerely thank everyone who has contributed their time voluntarily to assist in the renovation work at HAC House. There has been countless man hours over many years.

Whilst there is still work remaining to finalise the renovations, we now have a space that we can all be proud of for many years to come.


Disney's Peter Pan Jr

The HAC was proud to present the "world premiere" of "Scenes From a Newsreel: Ten Glimpses of Modern Life" in march 2015 at the Wesley Performing Arts Centre. The cast played to four appreciative and vocal audiences. Director and writer of this original series of short plays, James Garrett, was thrilled with the reception it received. The feedback from audience members suggested that they enjoyed the variety of theatre genres presented, and they liked the format of several short plays linked together by the final dramatic vignette, which was performed in the style of 'readers theatre'.

Lighting Workshop with Keith Bradshaw

On Saturday 30 May 2015, the HAC held a lighting workshop at the Wesley Performing Arts Centre.

The workshop was conducted by Keith Bradshaw, an ex-member of the HAC who has so far had an incredible career which has taken him around the world.

It was a fantastic day and very enlightening. It was great to hear of the career that Keith has had and what he has done. He is someone that everyone in the HAC should be justifiably proud of.

Some of the key learnings to come out of the workshop were as follows;

- 1. We all got a new appreciation for how expensive some of the lights are.
- 2. The importance of colour with lighting and how different colours mixed together will affect the look, including the sets, costumes, skin, etc.
- 3. Lights do not have to be used at full tilt. Many groups fall into that trap. Keith illustrated this really well.
- 4. The different types of lights & how they can be used.
- 5. The vital importance of including the lighting designer and operator early in the process if we want great results. Keith's comment was "you cannot expect the lighting man to move heaven & earth at the last minute".

The Lion King

When the first notes to the iconic 'Circle of Life' break into being, we were immediately aware that the commitment to bringing the Lion King to life by the Melbourne cast had succeeded. The rich full sound of both the cast and the orchestra was uplifting and the as the animals headed to the stage from all entrances, we were swept away into the world being created before us. Paul, Owen, Heath, Kathleen and I made the trip down to see 'The Lion King' during the Easter holidays. We were all very excited to see 'The Lion King' as the children were too young the last time this musical toured, and the music is often played in our house.



From the puppets in all their various forms to the puppet masters/performers, the characters were bold and painted in bright colours, both literally and figuratively. There were many forms of puppetry used, from the elephant puppet that required four people to manage it, to shadow puppetry, flights of birds balanced on heads, to my favourite, the cheetah, whose design and the talent of the puppeteer was most feline in movement. The drop down Lion faces of Mufasa and Scar, snapping down when the characters were enraged were also particularly clever, allowing the audience to be fully engaged with the performers face but still having use of the puppeteering side of the character.

The cast of 'The Lion King' were all vocally strong, with a range of experience, from the debutant adult Simba, whose commitment and enthusiasm was clear to see, to the experienced Scar, who was enjoyably evil. There were many cast members that have had a long running relationship with the musical, having performed in other incarnations of the show on the international stage. The character that stood out for me the most was Rafiki. From the bold and fearless character, who also sang some of my favourite parts of the show with an incredible sound, she owned the stage whenever she was on it. She is the wise fool and the sage. The moments she created, along with the opening of the second act 'One by One' had those indelibly gut grabbing African sounds that are slightly raw and incredibly powerful to me.

Owen, Heath and Kathleen all loved Zazu, Timon and Pumbaa, who were cheerful, colourful and very funny as the comic relief. All were strong vocalists and physical comics who often roused the audience to laughter.

The technical aspects of special effects and lighting were impressive and seamless and the orchestra was stunning. All in all we found this reincarnation of 'The Lion King' a wonderful night out.

If you want to judge if 'The Lion King' the musical is as engaging as the original movie to children of all ages, then the absolute engagement of my children through the whole show, followed by the insistence of playing the soundtrack all the way home in the car, should provide a resounding yes.

<u>Miss Saigon – Ballarat</u>


On Saturday May 16th, 13 members of the Horsham Arts Council travelled to Ballarat to watch BLOCs performance of Miss Saigon, which tells the tale of a doomed romance between a Vietnamese girl and an American soldier, a story that Les Miserables creators Alain Boubil and Claude-Michel Schonberg adapted from Peirre Loti's novel Madam Chrysantheme which was used as the basis for Puccini's Madame Butterfly as well.

With a sweeping story line, lyrics and music there is a lot a cast and crew has to encompass to bring this story to life., which is exactly what Ballarat Light Opera Company achieved. From the intense and energetic the 'Heat is on in Saigon' the cast fully committed themselves to stepping into the seedy and slightly desperate world of Miss Saigon. The lead characters of Kim, Chris, John and Ellen were all performed with great vocal strength and conviction. In particular Kim's soared throughout her performance, a superb effort given how much stage time and song this character requires. A character which stood out for me was the character of the Engineer performed by Steve Armati. The character itself is well written and eye-catching, created to bring some light to the tragedy that is Miss Saigon, and all credit to Steve, he imbued the Engineer with many levels of dark humour, carrying the audience with him, whether he exuded dark malice or cheerful narcissism.

The chorus were fantastic keystones to the overarching story, with the chorus numbers being powerful both vocally and visually. The orchestra created a lush and full sound underpinned and enhanced the overall performance. One of the most memorable moments of BLOCs Miss Saigon is the opening of the second act with the male chorus and John performing 'Bui-Doi', the strength and emotion was awesome.

Much credit must go to the director, technical design and crew for creating a fantastic set for a technically challenging show. The helicopter scene at the embassy was a credit to their work and ingenuity and together with the choreography given to the performers during the struggle to break through the embassy gates, created another of my favourite moments in the show.

We were all so proud to see HAC members Erin Boutcher and Chris Versteegen, onstage as part of the cast of Miss Saigon. It was wonderful to sit back and watch this wonderful show, knowing that there were so many talented performers in it. It was all in all a lovely day.
