I am currently studying a Bachelor of Arts (Acting) at Federation University Australia in Ballarat. I am halfway through my second year at present.

Good things about this course... where to begin? I get to do what I love every single day and with others who share the same passion as I do. I am constantly challenging myself creatively and It has been an amazing experience.

The bad things... When you choose to do a course like this, you are signing up for something big! I think everyone needs to be aware of this if they are considering studying performing arts. You have to be 100% commitment and this can sometimes mean missing out on doing the things you love or being around the people you love, but it is a learning process and it gets easier in time, you just have to prioritise. It can also be extremely mentally and physically demanding, but once again, the end result makes it all worth it.



I have been able to pursue both music and performance during my time of study as we perform in class every day and we are always being assessed in this. But we also get to perform in one major production each semester, as well as some other minor performances scattered over the year.

I have also recently begun singing in a two-piece band with another local musician in Horsham, we hope to gradually build a name and start doing some gigs around town in the holiday season and on weekends.

I chose to make these commitments because I want to put myself out there in any way I can. Not only because it is good work experience, but because it makes me happy and I believe that is the most important part in all of this.

Money can be an issue when you choose to take this sort of path. You have to be prepared. You are paying for the course, living expenses, books and equipment... It all adds up. But if you are smart about it and learn to save, you will be fine. I have been very lucky to have an incredibly supportive family who have helped me get here, I owe them everything.

My hopes for the future are not entirely specific. I like to focus on the present, what I'm doing right now. The future will come later and I'm sure there will be some great opportunities out there for me. I would love to be a teacher some day so that I can share my passion with others and inspire them to achieve their goals. But for now, I am just focusing on completing the course.

My advice... If you wish to pursue performing arts through further study, I would highly recommend you just go for it! Even if you don't get in first time around, at least you can say you tried and that is a huge achievement in itself! I understand it can be a difficult decision to make. I personally struggled to make up my mind a lot! But you just have to ask yourself.. "What will make me happy?" Because at the end of the day you are doing is for YOU, no one else. So, you owe it to yourself to give it a go and see where it could take you. Productions I have been in with HAC include: CATS 2008 (minor role) The Good Young Man 2014 (major role) and What's New Pussycat 2014 (major role). I loved being involved with HAC because it is such an amazing little community to be a part of, you really do become a family. If it wasn't for HAC, I wouldn't be where I am today. They allowed me to experience performance on a new level and they taught me how to develop into a stronger and more confident performer. I will never forget how much they have done for me, I am so lucky to have had HAC as my starting point into this wild and wonderful new journey. Thanks guys!

HORSHAM COLLEGE'S PRODUCTION OF HAIRSPRAY JR.

To those of you who have seen this show - how fantastic was it! Having observed some of the rehearsals and knowing many of the young talent involved, I knew it was going to be good, but I was still blown away by just how good. Even more impressively; it wasn't just that students made up the cast, but that many of the technical roles were also handled by students.

The first time I saw the cast, it was their manner that first and foremost was so impressive. Their attentiveness, politeness and camaraderie amongst themselves made them stand out as an exceptional group to work with. The effort that each member put in to make their part the best they could became apparent later.

The casting was done with much vision by the director, Emily Friedrichsen, who could see possibilities in the raw talent during auditions, and who then so expertly guided them so that for each cast member their character became a perfect fit. For some it was a return to the stage and it was a joy to see them again and to notice how they had matured as performers from their first forays. They have been in excellent hands to be able to develop like this, having previously worked with Emily but also with the likes of Larissa Riddell and Lisa Thomas. For others it was a first attempt or a return after some time away and they handled it most competently. Larissa must also be acknowledged for much of the positive qualities of the cohort as many of the members had previously worked under her directorship either at Horsham College or in HAC's Peter Pan Jr, and where she always instilled a respectful and collaborative culture in her cast and crew, leaving a wonderful legacy for subsequent directors.

Most notable in the performance was the quality of the singing as understandably that can make or break a musical. The songs were of the iconic 60's style and the cast did them absolute justice. The majority of the leads with solos handled their songs capably and with confidence showing the effort put into learning their pieces. As a group they were spot-on melodically and rhythmically, singing with such emotion and enthusiasm that the audience could not fail to be drawn into the mood of the show. Thanks for this must also go to vocal director, Grace Risson, a past student of Horsham College, who most fortunately is currently on a gap year.

The dialogue was delivered seamlessly and for the most part, clearly. The acting was terrific and it was hard to know where to look for fear of missing something because there was never a static moment on the lit sections of the stage. Every character remained in character and their facial expressions and nuances of movement never stopped. The dancing was to be envied. Everyone on stage looked so energetic and so skilfully able to combine singing with dancing. The hours the cast put in to perfect the choreography really showed. There were some students from Murtoa and St Brigid's Colleges who lent their talents here.

The sets were magnificent and designed and built by the college's Hands on Learning program staff member, Luke Carr, with a team of his students. Credit must also go to Emily who gave up most of her last holidays to paint and decorate along with volunteer parents and students. They were also a credit to the small band of parents who spent an entire day bumping them in, and to those bumping them out, although being a weekend the latter had many willing hands to help, making the task less onerous and time-consuming. The props were minimal but effective, using only the bare necessities which were then whisked off to leave room for the delightfully large and frequent dance numbers.

The costumes were fantastic with some gorgeous dresses of the era no doubt requisitioned from family wardrobes. Whilst the majority were bought from a school which had put on the musical, there was still a lot of sourcing and alterations to be done along with some new costumes to be sewn. As always, Tina Fitzgerald was there with her amazing eye for detail to ensure that everything was in keeping. Some of her Textile students were seconded to help her with sewing some costumes and 'fat suits' and did a terrific job.

The lighting and set changes were very capably handled by students. The use of lighting very cleverly took advantage of the vast area of the Town Hall theatre stage. Often a scene was played out in the spotlight with that light then dimming only to light up another space and scene, all of which showed deftness on the part of the light techs. How awesome to already possess such stagecraft skills at such a young age!

Many other students were involved in front of house duties from selling programs to greeting the audience and distributing food and drink on Opening Gala Night while dressed in the theme of the musical. They conducted and comported themselves as great ambassadors of their school. This musical has well and truly raised the bar for school musicals. It was obvious that the students had a great time with it and it was obvious that they ended the show with the audience wanting more. It is hard to imagine any musical that Horsham College produces being able to top this one. However, having glimpsed more than enough talent in the younger and up and coming members of the cast, I suspect that I could be wrong.

Please note to participate in our volunteer program you must be at least 15 years of age. Volunteers aged 15-18 will be required to provide the consent of a parent or guardian.


