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Tim's Horsham Arts Council Journey

First of all, thank you for the opportunity to write a piece for the HAC newsletter. I joined last year as a way to meet people and to rediscover myself and my creative side. I was not in a great place in the second half of last year and joining a local social group was top of my list to recover and get an idea of whom I was going to be in the future. I was speaking with Deb Boutcher about expressing myself and finding a creative outlet. I mentioned HAC and Deb pointed me toward Luke Mitton, saying auditions were coming up shortly.

It was a fortuitous call to Luke that advised me of auditions coming up for 'Joseph' (a play, admittedly, I only knew two songs from, both sung by Michael Crawford). So I front up to dance choreography and then it all begins. First thought is, "what the hell am I doing here?" I hadn't done choreography of any nature for a long time and my last 'theatre



performance' was high school plays 26 years ago! I felt wayyyy over my head on that first day. A couple of days after that were the vocal auditions. I sang a song for my family and a song for me. I adore 'Gethsemane' from JCS (or 'Yosemite' as Beau would call it) and 'Sweet Transvestite' from Rocky Horror (my personal fave musical). I still remember the looks on some faces (all positive, but my hands were shaking the whole time). To get a call back was a great feeling and I was given the challenge of 'Canaan Days' for the audition. I fell in love with that song from the first listen. I practised and practised and watched the brothers in many forms and plays to get an idea of what was going on. To be offered the role of Simeon is a privilege and one I don't take lightly.

I have many positives from my experience thus far, but I thought I would share a few:

- 1. This place exists. Creativity is much maligned and disregarded in some small towns and there can be stigmas or negative attitudes attached to people who wish to express themselves in this way. I am glad this exists as it gives people young and old an outlet that is both nourishing and fulfilling.
- 2. HAC takes itself seriously and endeavours to put on good shows. I have seen a couple in my time and was impressed with the quality of performance in such a small population. Yes it can be stressful for committee, directors, choreographer, coaches and the cast and crew. But we do it for a collective purpose. The payoff at the end of the rainbow (to quote Jess)
- 3. Support and encouragement; thank you for making me feel welcome from the start. It is not easy to come into an environment not knowing anyone, but I had no choice. I have received some very kind words of support in my time at HAC. I have been able to bring Harvey to a few rehearsals and was very appreciative that this flexibility was available to me. Jess had a great chat with me, reassuring me of the flexibility to make it work; Simon and co. supported this sentiment. Not only has Harvey really enjoyed the experience, he has also seen his Dad in another light something I genuinely wanted to do. Without that support I don't think some of this could have been possible. I have paid it forward by being supportive to others. Support is given and then it should be returned.
- 4. Kids/Youth; It has been wonderful to watch younger kids and teens get into the creative path. I would not have had the guts to do this at their age and admire any parents that have encouraged their child's participation. Much respect to the teenagers in the crew. There is some serious talent in this group of young people. I respect that you would have the spirit and drive to have a go at this.
- 5. Volunteerism is alive people give up their time, work hours in the background and for what? To provide an opportunity for the community to be creative. I genuinely worry about the evaporation of volunteers in our community, but I see it beat at HAC. I always think there could and should be more participation spread across an organisation so the same people don't get lumbered with responsibility each time, but that's common across a lot of social groups. I see Kenny and Jack, Gen and Col working along in the background. I was brought up by my late parents to be a volunteer and believe in giving back to community with whatever you can afford to give. Washing a floor or providing an extra set of hands is just part of the collective journey. This is not about 'me' but 'we'.

Jesus Christ Superstar review

Ballarat Lyric Theatre

Wendouree Centre for Performing Arts

The future of theatre involves digital projections, mechanical set pieces and simultaneous live filming. Yet the heart and soul of theatre will always be actors creating committed, fascinating and breath-taking performances, musicians collaborating to transport an audience and a production team that is focussed on delivering a vision which pays homage to the source material and adds individual flair. Jesus Christ Superstar delivered all of these elements and more.





Ballarat Lyric Theatre, under the watchful and inspired direction of Steve Armati, took on the epic tale of Jesus Christ in his final days during their recent production of *Jesus Christ Superstar*. Needless to say, my lofty expectations were met with overwhelming success. Lead

actor Laurence Heenan was a stoic and mindful Jesus who clearly displayed the sense of dread associated with the role. Alongside Laurence, Judas performer Aidan Brady showed vulnerability and brotherhood that ultimately resulted in his impending betrayal. Erin and I were fortunate enough to see both Aidan and Dylan Shalless, who also played the role of Judas on alternate nights. Where Aidan showed vulnerability, Dylan showed intensity and reflected Judas' unwanted pressures.

A production of this scale was ideal for the Wendouree Performing Arts Centre. As beautiful and awe-inspiring as Ballarat's Her Majesty's Theatre is, the ambitious set design which featured a platform that could be raised accordingly behind steps across the entire width of the stage and the orchestra positioned on the stage, was ideally suited to the modern surrounds of Wendouree. This also allowed the three MCG-sized screens to fit across the cyclorama and project live-feeds and also local Ballarat landmarks to enhance the modern interpretation.

Musically, the show was faultless. The special cameo performance by lead guitarist Lyndon Kriss was a certain highlight. Special mention goes to the vast talents of the ensemble who created the passion necessary to eventually force Jesus' crucifixion. Mary Magdalene was portrayed angelically by Shelley Svoza, her kindness and empathy towards Jesus and the other disciples, specifically Simon, was a refreshing take on the role. Liam Kelly's performance of Simon Zealotes was raw and youthful, he makes a powerhouse punk front man. Of course, a mention must go to the whip-wielding Samuel Apineru who had every woman in the audience swooning. Jesus Christ Superstar was an incredible production that did not shy away from experimentation. I am certain it will be remembered for many years to come for its strong casting, remarkable vocal performances and exceptional story telling. A wonderful production worthy of its second viewing.

Shrek Review

On, Saturday 17th of March, 4 HAC members travelled down to see SLAMS production of 'Shrek' the Musical which was being performed at the Alan Ross Centre at Billanook College in Mooroolbark. We were very excited to see how a non-professional company would deal with the technical requirements of a show like 'Shrek' as well as looking forward to seeing the engaging and entertaining show that it is. We were not disappointed.

Given the constraints of the performance centre that 'Shrek' was being performed in – there were no flies and only some tracks that set could run on, the setting for the show was at times minimalistic with clever choices of when to use their large set on tracks. Farquaad's castle was simple, yet well designed, the bath for his bathtub scene, and the oversize horse that Farquaad rides were fantastic. When they didn't have a great deal of set, they used clever, tight lighting to create the atmosphere that they wanted. Making use of the lighting to aid Fiona's transformations, allowed the magic of these scenes to flow through to the audience. Due to a lack of flies, they did not fly Fiona, however that did not detract from the overall quality of the show, they dealt with the technical constraints they had with creativity. The orchestra was incredibly tight and professional, with great sound mix and quality, having the space to put them in a room separate to the performance area, allowed the music to be impeccably controlled.

The cast of 'Shrek' was generally younger, with a few seasoned performers who's experience lifted the pure enthusiasm of the cast who were very obviously enjoying themselves, into a thoroughly enjoyable and engaging show. The lead actor Jay Haggett ha wonderful vocals as the title character of Shrek. Ryan Purdy as Donkey and Tayla Thomas as Fiona, rounded out a tight knit lead trio, the comic timing of Fiona and Donkey had the audience cackling throughout the show. Jonathan Guthrie-Jones as Lord Farquaad stole the limelight every time he waddled onto stage on his knees as the pint sized would-be king. His use of vocal characterisations and facial expressions were quite incredible and his performance was captivating. The ensemble was solid, with a few stand out moments, like the choreography for the 3 Blind Mice, who blithely went about their way, regardless of what any one else was doing. The choreography was relatively simple, but tight, the tap dancing mice and the sharp controlled movements of the citizens of Duloc were great. Costumes and puppetry were also a standout, with SLAMS creating all their own puppets and costumes.

Watching it critically with an eye to how other non-professional companies handle the technical challenges and complexities that a lot of newer musicals present us with, I was still completely engaged and thoroughly enjoyed a bright, tight and funny show.
