Review of Lord of The Flies



The HAC would like to congratulate the talented young performers who recently took part in Kick Up the Artz's production of *Lord of the Flies*. It was fantastic to see HAC members and new faces on the stage, with young people among the strongest performers in the Wimmera.

A mammoth undertaking for youth performers, the production was full of high energy drama, with strong acting ability needed to sustain the intense, animalistic nature of many characters. It was clear that many young people on the stage had studied *Lord of*

the Flies beyond their years and had begun to confront some of the existential themes within the show, and a highlight of the performance was seeing how the cast bonded between the acts to rid themselves of the violence they had portrayed on-stage.

Larissa Riddell and Amy Anselmi should be commended for their commitment to giving young people the opportunity to perform. *Lord of the Flies* was a wonderful example of how simple staging and imaginative production elements can avoid over -complicating the narrative of a minimalist story and focus audience attention on the motivation of characters.




Review of Ballarat Lyric Theatre Society's Jekyll & Hyde



Jekyll & Hyde is a challenging musical to put on, both professionally and by amateur organisations. Two previous professional incarnations of the show never made it to the stage in Australia over the last twenty years, because of financial backing issues. The dark, gothic subject matter and the soaring opera/rock sound track has given it a cult following, but sometimes the story has had difficulties translating to the stage. Ballarat Lyric took on the challenge of taking the dramatic subject matter and bringing in to audiences in Ballarat, creating powerful moments and wonderful harmonies.

The director brought to the audience an unflinching view of the underside of Jekyll's London, with the character's darker side put on full display. The Board of Governors were strongly portrayed in all their various incarnations of evil, with very clever casting and character portrayal. Spider, the proprietor of the whorehouse The Red Rat, created a direct sense of violence and menace. The cast members portraying these roles were fully committed to creating these roles and did not shy away from showing the seedy side of human nature. Dylan Shalless, who is about to hit the stage with HAC as Drew in *Rock of Ages*, was particularly strong in his dual natures of Jekyll and Hyde struggling for dominance.



The character of Lucy was also portrayed with great skill, creating a dynamic picture of a woman who is trapped by her life, but also comfortable because she knows where she stands in it; longing for something more, aware of the danger, but also the attraction that she has to Jekyll in both of his incarnations.

The ensemble was very strong vocally, with harmonies sitting solidly, and characters being well portrayed in their scenes. The choreography of moving the ensemble on and off was tight and very smooth, moving seamlessly through their continuous movement during the big scenes. They created the rich and full sound that *Jekyll and Hyde* has, and was fantastic to hear, well-matched by a tight and professional-sounding orchestra. The lighting design was also very well done, with precise and clean lighting changes, aiding in the creation of the gothic atmosphere of the story. The set – a rotating and unfurling two storey tower - allowed smooth transitions between scenes, with much credit going to the crew who operated the set. It was a job very well done.

Congratulations to Ballarat Lyric Theatre on their season of Jekyll and Hyde.


Zoe Hanson (Protestor)
