to the performances. Our HAC shows are about the community that we create along the way, and I miss our community.





Once this is done, there will be a reworking of how the space is used to make the functionality of the area more flexible. It is exciting to think that the finished product will hopefully be able to be used for more comfort and flexibility as a reception area as well as a rehearsal space for vocals, choreography and bands/orchestra and a meeting place when needed. Being more easily multi-functional will be a great asset to our space.

Plans are proceeding to collate and correctly archive our many hard copy scripts and scores. We have some antique paperwork and it will be great to have work done to have it more securely stored.

We are exploring avenues for grants and looking at what opportunities lie ahead for the HAC family in the next 12 months; we are working hard on this.

It is hard - and if you are like myself, and I dare say a great number of our committee and community, it can be a force of will to maintain positivity and future focus. We miss you and we miss each other. This too shall pass, as our favourite little redheaded orphan said, 'The sun will come out tomorrow ... you're only a day away'. If you are struggling please reach out to someone. We want you to feel supported and cared for, even in these anxious and difficult times. 



Creative in Lockdown: How we always seem to find a way...

COVID-19 and various levels of restrictions have put a stop to many things that we love doing. And what we are still able to do looks very different to what we are used to. Like many other industries, the performing arts has had to close down much of what it does and adapt quickly to retain what it can. We have had many people start to perform online, as a way to uplift themselves and others, to continue to practise their craft, and as they have gotten more proficient with the technology which is fast adapting to demand, even paid performances.

In our local community, there are HAC members who work in the arts who have adapted how they teach and work to allow them to pursue their careers and provide their students with the opportunity to continue their development, an opportunity which is invaluable in these socially distanced times when people have not been able to perform, play sport, rehearse, see family and friends and all other manner of restrictions.

The Dancers Zone teachers moved all their classes online, with their teachers continuing to choreograph dances for their students and post them into the individual online groups set up. They post weekly with continuing progress on their dances. While not the same as being in the studio and working side by side, it has allowed them to provide the opportunity for their students to continue to learn and progress in something they love.


Horsham School of Music's Lisa Thomas also moved her vocal lessons to an online format. With zoom lessons being scheduled over a much more compressed time frame, it requires her students to be warmed up and ready to go by the time the lessons started during the first lockdown. By focusing on one song per lesson, it allowed Lisa to work with her students very specifically. Second time around, Lisa has moved to group Zoom lessons, with the eye towards preparing for a student concert, dependent on what the next few months look like. She knows that many of her students are missing so many performance opportunities and wants to provide them with an opportunity to do so if it can be done safely within the new 'normal'.

Maddi Ostapiw, proprietor of Maddi Ostapiw Vocal Studio, kept her full load of all the students who wished to continue vocal lessons online. Using Facetime and encouraging the use of headphones allowed a reasonable clarity, although at times it is dependent on internet quality as to how smoothly things run. One-on-one has allowed her to maintain the individual focus she wants in her lessons, and Maddi has spent a lot of time focusing on technique. It has been a hugely challenging time for all of our wonderful teachers working in the arts. Flexibility, patience, and the ability to adapt quickly to whatever this year has thrown at them has been a must. With some frustration with internet and technology, these teachers and their students have forged ahead to work together to continue to create art through 2020. We may have to do it differently, but we are still creating.

Hadestown album review

Hadestown is the creation of indie singer/songwriter Anais Mitchell. It was first recorded as a concept album in 2006, which gained popularity and traction, and in 2016 it opened off-Broadway, followed by a Broadway premiere in 2019. Each of these incarnations has a cast album available. Some of the time I have spent in lockdown has been listening to some new cast albums of shows I haven't heard before and once of them was the Broadway OST of Hadestown.

Like Les Miserables, Jesus Christ Superstar, Hamilton, and many other shows, Hadestown is a show in which the story is fully sung. The bonus of this soundtrack is that it is the recording of the complete show without anything being left out. This means, that for me, listening to the album without having seen the staged show, I could follow the story



seamlessly, which made the whole listening experience so much more enjoyable. Even with *Les Miserables*, one of my favourite shows, unless you have the full symphonic recording, cast recordings are edited, with parts removed for the sake of brevity.

Hadestown is drawn from two well-known tales of Greek mythology, that of the dreamers Orpheus and Eurydice, and the story of King Hades and his wife Persephone. As one reviewer wrote, Hadestown 'pits industry against nature, doubt against fear and fear against love'. The first song 'Road to Hell' immediately drags you into the world of Hadestown, with a jazz/blues feel and just a touch of gospel. The character of Hermes also acts as a narrator and walks listeners through the plot of the story you are going to hear. The first few songs introduce all the characters and we the listeners meet them where they are at. From dreamy Orpheus, to the determined Eurydice, to Persephone, disenchanted with Hades and the six-month deal she must be in the world before returning to Hades and the underworld for the next six months. Joined by the muses as part of a Greek Chorus, the characters all fall into archetypes, as Greek characters do, with the music and lyrics supporting these character developments beautifully.

Eurydice, while falling for Orpheus, decides to join Hades in the underworld rather than face hunger and insecurity above ground. Orpheus heads off on a daring rescue to try and bring her safely back. Persephone and Hades revisit their relationship and feelings for each other, and the story then follows the original myths through to their conclusions.

Throughout this journey, the music is a beautiful blend of jazz and classical Broadway, with hints of gospel, blues and even some modern folk and pop. It may seem like a lot of style, but they all weave together beautifully. There are recurring motifs musically that wind through the album which help tie the story together. The music is gorgeous, but never distracts from the vocals and the story those vocals are telling, which makes the whole album easy to listen to and understand.

Hadestown is quite different to a lot of the new shows and cast albums that are doing the rounds at the moment. I really enjoyed both the storyline and how it presents on the album, the musical styles and the energy of the cast that translates into the album. I would highly recommend that you have a listen to the album and let it take you through the beautiful story that is *Hadestown*

Wesley Performing Arts Centre to be brought back to life

An exciting new project has begun on the 100 -year-old building housing the Wesley Performing Arts Centre (WPAC).

The "Performing Arts Services Demand Assessment Study" was conducted in 2018. Passion for the WPAC was abundantly clear as a significant cultural asset for the Wimmera community.



Rectification and upgrade works have commenced with the formation of the WPAC Redevelopment Project Control Group (PCG) comprising members from the HRCC and the WPAC committee. This collaboration will seek the appropriate advice and implement remediation works that are required before an emergency order can be lifted.

The PCG is working to establish a full scope and cost of the works, and to establish realistic timelines to enable specifications for each job to go out to tender, be evaluated and then awarded to the appropriate contractor.

This upgrade will see the venue safely re-opening to the public and, once again, be a favourite with local and visiting performers. It will also be a venue for ceremonies, funerals, weddings and community events because of its intimacy, acoustics, and central location.

The WPAC committee confirmed that proceeds from the sale of the Horsham Music Academy in December 2019 have been committed to the WPAC upgrade works.



The PCG envisages that the WPAC will reopen in 2021. Updates will be provided to the community throughout the project.

It has been a long road, but there is a "spot" light at the end of the tunnel. The WPAC will once again become an integral part of the performing arts and cultural scene within the Wimmera community.
